

QIBB - VET Quality Initiative

- Part of the national strategy to implement the EQAVET recommendation
- It is the national quality framework for Austrian VET-providers
- Quality development at the levels of the schools, provincial governments and the federal government

- Application of recognised QM instruments and methods
- Economical use of time and financial resources
- Ethics in relation to evaluation objectives, evaluation measures and the handling of data
- Gender equality




What is Peer Review?

- Peer Review is a voluntary external evaluation tool.
- Peer Review aims to foster quality assurance and quality development.
- It is a formative evaluation instrument.
- It is not an instrument for control.
- It is an instrument for development.

The Phases of Peer Review





Application and Preparation

- Finding quality areas for the Peer Review
- Finding questions of interest
- Choosing and inviting the peers
- Self evaluation and self report
- Preparing the peer visit



The Peer Visit

- Collecting data
- Analysing data
- Evaluation
- Oral feedback



The Peer Report

- Draft report
- Comments of the VET-provider
- Final report



The Follow-up Process

- Developing innovative ideas
- Compiling project tasks
- Implementation of reform projects



The Principles

- Voluntarism
- Confidentiality
- Objectivity and impartiality of the peers
- The VET-provider's responsibility for the process and for the results



Who are the Peers?

- Persons on an equal footing with the persons being evaluated
- Working in a comparable organisation
- External and independent
- Have specific professions (e.g. expertise in evaluation, gender, diversity ...)



What Peer Review is for

- Obtaining critical feedback for your organisation from colleagues in the field.
- Providing you with an external perspective.
- Ascertaining and improving the quality of the services you provide.
- Presenting your strengths.
- Detecting blind spots and weaknesses.
- Obtaining an external evaluation report.
- Improving internal awareness about your strengths and areas for improvement.



What Peer Review is not for

- Solving conflicts within your organisation.
- Glorifying your organisation.
- Blaming your organisation.
- Answering unimportant questions.
- Producing secret documents.
