

CONTEXT – COUNTY DONEGAL

- County Donegal is one of the 26 counties of the Republic of Ireland.
- Located in the northwest corner of Ireland, Donegal is the island's northernmost county. In terms of size and area, it is the fourth-largest county in all of Ireland.
- Uniquely, County Donegal shares a small border with only one other county in the Republic of Ireland – County Leitrim. Most of its land border (93%) is shared with three counties of Northern Ireland: County Tyrone, County Londonderry and County Fermanagh.



EDUCATION AND TRAINING BOARDS IN IRELAND



- On 1st July 2013, the 33 Vocational Education Committees (VECs) were dissolved and replaced by 16 Education and Training Boards (ETBs).
- Education and Training Boards are statutory education authorities with responsibility for education and training, youth work and a range of other statutory functions.
- Education and Training Boards are the driving force of education and training in the local community, with pathways for every learner across Early Education, Community National Schools, Post primary Education, Further Education and Training, Apprenticeships and Traineeships, Youth Services, Outdoor Education Services and Community Education Services.

The general functions of an Education and Training Board, include:

Establish maintain, coordinate and review the provision of:

- recognised schools or centres for education
- education or training facilities
- youthwork services
- prisons

Develop and adopt a <u>Strategy Statement</u> and <u>Annual</u> <u>Service Plan</u>

ETBs are active in local communities through the direct provision of training and education programmes delivered in training centres, colleges and other training and educational settings.

External Organisation



Quality and Qualifications Ireland - QQI is the state agency responsible for promoting quality and accountability in the further and higher education and training sectors.





SOLAS - Funds, coordinates, and monitors a range of FET programmes in Ireland.

Education and Training Boards Ireland - Is the national representative body established to collectively represent the sixteen Education and Training Boards (ETBs) and promote their interests.

Further Education Support Service – supports ETBs offering programmes leading to QQI certification from the National Framework of Qualifications, levels 1-6.




DONEGAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING BOARD (ETB)

- In line with legislation, Donegal Vocational Educational Committee (VEC) was dissolved and replaced by Donegal Education and Training Board. The ETB was established under and is governed according to The Education and Training Boards Act (2013).
- The Further Education and Training Act (2013) also dissolved the former Foras Áiseanna Saothair (FÁS) training centres and established SOLAS as a new statutory body. Former FÁS provision transferred to Education and Training Board governance in 2014.
- Donegal Education and Training Board is a Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) legacy provider, currently operating under two Quality Assurance agreements with QQI. We are in a transition phase, seeking to adopt the best practice from both former organisations to ensure that students are offered an accessible, high-quality, enhancement- focused experience which meets all statutory and reporting requirements.
- Donegal ETB is structured with three pillars: Further Education and Training (FET), Schools and Organisation Support and Development (OSD).




DONEGAL ETB ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

DONEGAL ETB FURTHER EDUCATION AND TRAINING (FET) <u>SERVICE</u>

- Donegal ETB is the largest Further Education and Training provider in the county. It offers a comprehensive and diverse range of part time and full-time provision that meets the complex needs of students and the socio-economic development demands of the county.
- The service has many programmes, each with its own distinct identity and target cohort.
 Programmes are based in 19 Further Education and Training centres geographically spread across the county.
- The dispersed nature of the Community Education programme, part-time and contracted training provision allow for an established presence in multiple community settings on an outreach/partnership basis, in addition to the recognised ETB FET centres.

DONEGAL ETB FET


- The FET Service offers thirty-four programmes of Further Education and Training
- Certification is offered through programmes ranging from levels 1 to 6 on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) as well as a wide range of vendor and industry-certified programmes and awards.
- Our FET Service also delivers Apprenticeships within our two Training Centres.
- To date in 2023, 15,312 Donegal ETB FET students participated in the FET provision.






• Our student population is wide and very diverse.

2023 (TO DATE) DONEGAL ETB GENDER BREAKDOWN




In 2022, there were 195 different nationalities enrolled in FET.





GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT OF QUALITY ASSURANCE WITHIN FET

- As required by the QQI Core Statutory Quality Assurance guidelines, the ETB's FET Service developed a Quality Assurance Governance structure. The groups are as follows:
 - Quality Council
 - Programme Sub Committee
 - Quality Sub Committee
 - Certification Approval Board.
- To support the QA governance groups and the objective separation required, the Quality Assurance Support Service (QASS) was formed. Part of their remit is to develop the new Quality Assurance system for the ETB's FET Service.
- The <u>Student Voice</u> within Governance and management of QA.



THE QUALITY ASSURANCE SUPPORT SERVICE



- Offers wide-ranging QA support to the FET staff and other stakeholders both operationally and strategically.
- Develops, implements and monitors the integrated QA system
- The QASS performs an essential role in the QA cycle, which is critical to the organised and structured evaluation process that underpins our new Quality Assurance system.

DEVELOPING A SINGLE QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM

- In line with the ETB's Vision, Mission and Strategy statements, and to continuously improve the quality of the student experience, the ETB's FET Service is in the process of integrating the two current Quality Assurance systems. This will facilitate the gradual transition to a single system, drawing on best practice from both to reflect the unified and integrated nature of the FET Service.
- Through the development of Quality Assurance Policies, we are establishing a coherent framework for enhancing the quality of FET provision.
- The purpose of the policies are for the ETB's FET Service to deliver its education and training programmes to the highest standard, whilst conforming to national and international best practice guidelines, policies and procedures and legal and statutory regulations.
- The development of a comprehensive suite of shared quality assurance policies and procedures for Donegal ETB's FET Service is a long-term project. As new shared policies and practices are developed and approved by the appropriate governance structure, they will supersede the existing individual policies and procedures that currently exist.

A rationale is presented to the FET SMT by the QASS to develop new or update existing Quality Assurance Policies and Procedures based on a specific need and in line with the QA Guidelines

A Draft Policy and Procedure is then produced by the QASS

Draft Policy and Procedures are reviewed by FET SMT

Draft Policy and Procedure is then issued for wider consultation with relevant stakeholders

After feedback, amendments a review of Policy and Procedures take place in preparation for operational use

The Draft Policy and Procedure presented to relevant governance subcommittee(s)

Following recommendations by the subcommittee, policy or procedure presented to Quality Council for Approval

Following approval from the Quality Council - presented to the ETB Board for information
